

Holly's Guide to Writing a Rhetorical Analysis

You're probably sitting like I was in Highschool wondering how to even start this damn paper, well this is more than just a single boring guide—it's relatable. You're confused, I get it. So, let's start off strong with this analysis. Just follow along and let's get a draft started!

Format: MLA, Black Font, 12PT, Double Space (typical MLA)

Introduction:

All introductions need a good thesis! I learned back in grade school that all thesis's should be formatted a certain way and should include the following:

- Title of Book/Article (Writing)
- Author's name and side of argument
- Some extraordinary word... (diction)
- Previews of the rhetorical devices that are going to be used
- SIGNAL PHRASES (a good extra point)
- Attention Getter: this could be very creative and with fact that is related to the article/topic.

Example:

In *Racism in Jury Selection Is Real. Can the Supreme Court Put an End to It?* by the editorial board in New York Times, the editorial board moderately observes and disputes whether or not the judicial system is unjust in discrimination using rhetorical devices such as factual evidence, diction, and allusion.

Go ahead, and pop an attention getter and get some emotions flowing in the front of that paragraph, and boom!—your introduction is clear.

Body:

The body always is the juice of the whole analysis! It sounds like a lot of extra work at first, but little did you know that the work is already in front of you. You just have to paraphrase and add key ingredients like a champ. In the body paragraphs you would need to find a way to rephrase one of the rhetorical devices used in the introduction, for example, the one I used is factual evidence. Always, Always, ALWAYS restate your thesis. KEY TO SUCCESS! You want to pretend that the reader is dumb and forgets what you're talking about 100% of the time, so you remind them.

Also, if you're using sources from a website, make sure you're not plagiarizing, and give the author some credit. CITE! And with
