	Stop & Check for Understanding	Stop when you do not understand what you are reading. Reread the sentence or paragraph.
	Use Context Clues	Use the words and pictures around the word to help you figure out what it means.
	Visualizing	Make a picture in your mind of what you are reading. This helps you understand what is happening.
	Ask Questions	Ask yourself questions about what you are reading. This helps you think about the text.
	Make Connections	Think about how what you are reading is similar to or different from what you know or what you have read before.
	Summarizing	Write down or say out loud what the main idea of the text is. This helps you understand the text better.

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Work for Understanding	Read and think about what you are reading. Stop when you do not understand what you are reading. Reread the sentence or paragraph.
