## CRITICAL RECEPTION:

- Published mid-20<sup>th</sup> century.
- He is African - American (this is his only novel)
- Reveals a lot about racism - they were appreciative of it and brought up black experience to the surface. Unveiled a lot.
- Liked it was an attempt to retrieve black history.
- Praise for its form - experiments with the form; does something new with conventional form. Innovative and breaking new grounds.
- Some say its too dense and literary. (its elitest)
- Appropriation - take some-else work and shape it into something else.

**FORM:** allusive - alludes to other things; other texts, authors mostly western one ( Dante, Conrad, Sophocles.

Vernacular → culture, philosophy, songs ( this makes it accessible)

- 'brotherhood' = communist party. This was critiqued [ brother jack ]
- Movement for black liberation is critiqued in this novel; Ras the Exhorter.
- Critics from a feminist perspective - divided into stereotypes (seductress, mother etc)

Over the next 15 years he published 10 short stories and 37 essays on literary, cultural, and political topics. But when *Invisible Man* was published in 1952, Ellison received immediate acclaim from a wide variety of critics, scholars, and novelists. While his novel emerged as a major work of African American literature, it also engaged the European literary tradition and influenced an entire generation of post-World War II writers.
