of diversifying them and making them less tedious But I am occupying myself over matters about which perhaps people will take no notice whilst I have reason to apprehend much more important objections There are only two principal ones which can be made against me the one that this book is licentious the other that it does not sufficiently spare the fair sex With regard to the first I say boldly that the nature of what is understood as a tale decided that it should be so it being an indispensable law according to Horace or rather according to reason and common sense that one must conform one s self to the nature of the things about which one writes Now that I should be permitted to write about these as so many others have done and with success I do not believe it can be doubted and people cannot condemn me for so doing without also condemning Ariosto before me and the Ancients before Ariosto It may be said that I should have done better to have suppressed certain details or at least to have disguised them Nothing was more easy but it would have weakened the tale and taken away some of its charm So much circumspection is only necessary in works which promise great discretion from the beginning either by their subject or by the manner in which they are treated I confess that it is necessary to keep within certain limits and that the narrowest are the best also it must be allowed me that to be too scrupulous would spoil all He who would wish to reduce Boccaccio to the same modesty as Virgil would assuredly produce nothing worth having and would sin against the laws of propriety by setting himself the task to observe them For in order that one may not make a mistake in matters of verse and prose extreme modesty and propriety are two very different things Cicero makes the latter consist in saying what is appropriate one should say considering the place the time and the persons to whom one is speaking This principle once admitted it is not a fault of judgment to entertain the people of to day with Tales which are a little broad Neither do I sin in that against morality *Blues and Evil* Jon Michael Spencer,1993 The term blues has traditionally conveyed an image of hard living hard drinking carousing singers and musicians grinding out melancholy tunes and evil lyrics Contesting that stereotypical notion this study argues that spiritual values are clearly reflected in the blues mythologized history folk theological language and philosophical speculation on the dual existence of good and evil By using a theomusicalogical approach Yahya Jongintaba formerly Jon Michael Spencer is able to push aside accepted attitudes and present a unique study of the blues and the culture that created it He reveals religious substance in this music s content and language that has been gradually obscured as the blues evolved from a simple rural music following Reconstruction to its present urban form The evidence strongly implies a fundamental religious concern for the same life issues expressed in orthodox religious music Spencer suggests that white blues scholars have tended to overlook the religious nature of the blues partly because they have not fully understood African American culture They have tended to give validity to the old southern folkloric belief that blues music was devil s music disregarding the ethos of the blues as it exists on the periphery of doctrinal Christianity where religious pondering as well as opposition to white oppression could be expressed behind a protective veil of music Pete's Devils Charles Abel Adams,1902 **Tales of Languedoc** Samuel Jacques Brun,1899 Great Russian
