Frederick Douglass was born a slave in 1818 in Maryland. He learned to read and write, escaped to New York, and became a leader in the abolitionist movement. He engaged in speaking tours and edited *North Star*, a newspaper named for the one gold-escaping southern slave could rely on to find their way to freedom. Douglass is best known for his autobiographic *Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass* (1845), from which "Learning to Read and Write" is excerpted.
