Follow-up on implementation of parenting strategies and assessment of home environment following recent Child Protective Services involvement.

Case notes

Home environment:

House was clean and organized, adequate food supplies observed in kitchen, children's rooms were tidy with age-appropriate toys and books.

Parenting strategies:

Sarah demonstrated use of "time-out" technique as discussed in previous session, reported consistent use of reward chart for positive behaviors, John actively participating in bedtime routine.

Client progress:

Sarah reports attending 3/4 parenting classes since last visit, has been consistently taking prescribed anxiety medication, expressed feeling more confident in handling children's behavior.

Concerns:

Sarah mentioned occasional arguments with John about discipline methods, youngest child (age 3) showing signs of speech delay.

Next steps

Provide referral for speech evaluation for youngest child.

Schedule joint session with Sarah and John to address co-parenting concerns.

Continue weekly home visits for next month, then reassess frequency.

Follow up on Sarah's progress with parenting classes and anxiety management.

Travels in the Trench Between Child Welfare Theory and Practice George Thomas, 1994 Travels in the Trench Between Child Welfare Theory and Practice examines how the child welfare field's rush to establish credibility and permanence through program growth during the post World War II era gave rise to a massive but fragile conglomerate unprepared to

prove its merits when challenged by an increasingly dubious public Author George Thomas proposes a broad based shift from program growth to knowledge based growth in policy management education research and information technology initiatives to revitalize performance and restore public confidence in the system Thomas s book proposes to shift the leadership emphasis away from the big business flavor of child welfare and re define it into a mediator role of trusting worker and client competencies *Travels in the Trench Between Child Welfare Theory and Practice* shows how the two sides merge and concentrate on five key issues Policy Contrasts the impact of the two orientations on shaping the field s sense of mission defining its role establishing its priorities for growth relative to size specialization and knowledge base and stimulating or reducing client adversarialism and public perceptions of chronic mission failure Management Examines how the priorities of the two orientations differ relative to preserving hierarchical authority rewarding work that exceeds mandates promoting innovation and experimentation and relying on process as distinct from client outcome accountability Education Examines how the priorities of the two orientations differ relative to relying on manpower and brain power on one right way of doing things versus doing what is legal and ethical Research Examines how the priorities of the two orientations differ relative to confirming the rightness of the field s existing knowledge base and testing it to expand its scientifically validated portion through discovery Information Technology Explores how the priorities of the two orientations differ relative to disclosing and preserving privileged communications developing common and specialized language and breaking down or protecting authority and status differentials This historical and cross sectional analysis forms a framework proposing that the field s future value in meeting the nation s child welfare needs must have a willingness to shift its commitments from problem to competency oriented theory and practice to accept a de emphasis on growth and a reduction in specialization and to redirect investments in education research and information technology According to Thomas this enables readers to revitalize practice wisdom grow the scientifically validated portion of the field s knowledge base and begin to restore public confidence in the system The book s contents are presented in interview style to enliven the material and make it more accessible to a wide audience The reader determines the sense and direction of the analysis and the appropriateness of the questions from which it flows *Travels in the Trenches* is intended to promote critical analysis of the link between long range vision and its impact on daily practice

Shadik, 2022-10-31 Social workers need to work with fathers across many service systems but lack guidance on how to do so and most engagement assessment and intervention work for family serving systems is mother and child focused Father inclusive readings and resources are also limited Drawing on the expertise of well regarded research and practice experts in the field this comprehensive book provides guidance to social work practitioners and researchers on how to engage assess and serve fathers Instructors can use the text to include fathers in courses on the human behavior and social environment family systems clinical practice diversity or service systems Social service systems unfortunately have

often struggled to positively engage men as parents. Recent demographic trends indicate that fathers are providing more direct care to children and single father households are one of the most rapidly growing demographic groups in the United States. Barriers to their successful engagement include biases and assumptions about men and fathers, a lack of father-friendly policies and practices in the field, limited training on how to work with fathers, and relatively limited father-inclusive social work research until recently. This book addresses these barriers. It is a guide to social workers in their efforts to better serve men as parents and does so from an ecological and systems perspective. Multiple case examples and practical tools are provided, as well as specific content on major social service systems. Topics explored include Father Engagement, Organizational Father-Friendly Assessments, Interventions with Fathers, Setting the Course for Future Theory Research and Practice with Fathers, Social Work Practice with Fathers, Engagement Assessment and Intervention.
