5. METACOGNITION

Provide opportunities for self-monitoring, self-testing, and self-explanation.

Examples: Use learning journals, reflection activities, self-assessments, goal setting, and think-aloud protocols for learners to verbalize their thought process as they work through problems.

4. SPACED REPETITION

Optimize learning by reviewing material at increasing intervals over time.

Examples: Design progressive learning modules, flashcards with spaced repetition algorithms, adaptive quizzes, and spaced review prompts or reminders to learners at strategic intervals.



1. VISUAL MNEMONICS

Associate new information with vivid mental images.

Examples: Include acronyms (STEM) and acrostics (PEMDAS), mind maps and concept maps, imagery, diagrams, and memory palaces (associate information with specific locations in a mental map).

2. DUAL CODING

Use both verbal and visual representations of information.

Examples: Pair written explanations with diagrams, charts, and graphic visualizers; Use interactive whiteboard exercises or infographics, and virtual lab simulations with annotations.

3. INTERLEAVED PRACTICE

Mix different topics or skills during practice sessions.

Examples: Include case studies that involve decision-making, strategic planning, and financial analysis, or language exercises that test vocabulary, comprehension, and sentence completion.

Fred Westbrook, 2017-08-22 Changes in food composition and availability have contributed to the dramatic increase in obesity over the past 30 40 years in developed and increasingly in developing countries The modern diet now contains many foods that are rich in saturated fat and refined sugar People who eat excessive amounts of this diet are not only likely to become overweight even obese develop metabolic and cardiovascular diseases some forms of cancer but also undergo a more rapid rate of normal age related cognitive decline and more rapid progression of neurological diseases such as dementia A central problem is why people persist in consuming this diet in spite of its adverse health effects and when alternative food choices are available As high fat high sugar foods are inherently rewarding eating for pleasure like taking psychoactive drugs can modulate reward neurocircuitry causing changes in responsiveness to reward predicting stimuli and incentive motivation Indeed the excessive ingestion in modern societies and the resulting obesity epidemic may be viewed as a form of food addiction Thus a diet high in palatable foods is proposed to impact upon reward systems in the brain modulating appetitive learning and altering reward thresholds Impairments in other forms of cognition have been associated with obesity and these have a rapid onset The hippocampus appears to be particularly vulnerable to the detrimental effects of high fat and high sugar diets Recent research has shown that as little as one week of exposure to a high fat high sugar diet leads to impairments in place but not object recognition memory in the rat Excess sugar alone had similar effects and the detrimental effects of diet consumption was linked to increased inflammatory markers in the hippocampus a critical region involved in memory Furthermore obesity related inflammatory changes have also been described in the human brain that may lead to memory impairments These memory deficits may contribute to pathological eating behaviour through changes in the amount consumed and timing of eating The aim of this eBook is to present up to date information about the impact of diet and diet induced obesity on reward driven learning memory and cognition encompassing both animal and human literature and also potential therapeutic targets to attenuate such deficits
